Along with more bikes on the road enjoying the long days we've also noticed more vehicles of all different shapes and sizes. The summer travel season is upon us and with so many vehicles out there we need to be even more aware and defensive when riding.

In the past couple of weeks, there have been a couple more motorcycle accidents that have resulted in fatalities. Speed has been a factor as well as riding outside of your comfort zone and/or ability level. Do not ever ride outside of your comfort zone or ability level. Riding while scared or fearful will be a distraction from your good riding skills.

Some accidents are caused by drivers or riders around us who do not always use their best judgment out on the road. We've all seen that occasional rider smoking a cigarette while riding down the road. Or the "I'm so important" person talking on the cell with only one hand navigating the handlebars. The ones that can't always be detected until it's too late are the alcohol impaired drivers or riders. The Colorado State Patrol issued a press release in May regarding this year's summertime campaign called "100 Days of Heat". This campaign will have an unprecedented level of summertime DUI enforcement between the Colorado State Patrol and other law enforcement agencies across Colorado. It will run from Memorial Day through Labor Day because more than one-third of all alcohol related fatalities in Colorado last year occurred between those two holidays. They stated that in 2008, 38% of all traffic fatalities in the state involved alcohol, killing 211 people. Even though we, as GWRRA members, do not participate in drinking and driving/riding that doesn't mean we won't encounter someone who shares that belief.

So please whether you are planning a short ride or a lengthy vacation on your goldwing, be aware of everything happening around you.

Today was a great day at the Colorado Ride for Kids. We had 146 bikes and four survivors. There were more Harleys participating than we have had in the past in Colorado.

The ride manager, Robert, asks each of the top individuals/couples how they were able to raise their money and why they do it. One individual shared that she is a cancer survivor and feels very strongly about helping the children. One couple lost their 19 year old daughter two years ago to a brain tumor.

Many of you who have participated in past rides will remember Spencer. He was back and has started learning to drive.

There was one little girl and her parents who left before ride began or could be introduced to the bikers. Her parents just found out that she has a brain tumor – she is a little doll and only 6 months old.

The top dealer was once again Apex Sports, over \$12,000. Top chapter/club was GWRRA CO L, over \$12,100. And Pam McCombs, with over \$7500, as top individual. The total for today was just over \$49,100.

When I asked people to make a donation, they would ask, "what's your goal?" My goal this year was not a monetary goal, it was to get more bikers to the ride and raise the awareness of this devastating childhood illness. PJ, the Task Force Leader, asked in each of her emails for people to bring three new riders to the ride. I meet PJ's goal. I exceeded that goal. I was able to get 14 new riders. Over one-third of the riders today had never been to a Ride for Kids.

Today was ... It's really hard to describe what today meant. For me to look up and see Butch leading almost thirty bikes was overwhelming. The group included Chapter N, Chapter I, Pikes Peak HOG Chapter #405, Green Knights Chapter 25, and friends.
